Title and commencement.

1. This order may be cited as the Notifiable Diseases Order 1993 and shall come into operation one week after the date of publication of the order.

Notifiable diseases.

2. The infectious diseases listed in the Schedule to this order are notifiable diseases for the purpose of Part IV of the Act and except as is provided for in paragraphs 3 and 4, the provisions of Part IV shall apply in respect of those diseases.

Venereal disease.

3. The provisions of this order shall not apply where a person suffering from venereal disease is under specific and adequate treatment and by reason of habits, condition of life and residence, is (in the opinion of the medical practitioner attending the case) unlikely to spread the disease.

4. The Infectious Diseases Order and the Notifiable Diseases (Amendment) Order 1992 are revoked.
